#### **Step Seven:**

"Humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings."

SINCE this Step so specifically concerns itself with humility, we should pause here to consider what humility is and what the practice of it can mean to us.

Indeed, the attainment of greater humility is the foundation principle of each of A.A.'s Twelve Steps. For without some degree of humility, no alcoholic can stay sober at all.

Nearly all A.A.'s have found, too, that unless they develop much more of this precious quality than may be required just for sobriety, they still haven't much chance of becoming truly happy. Without it, they cannot live to much useful purpose, or, in adversity, be able to summon the faith that can meet any emergency.

Humility, as a word and as an ideal, has a very bad time of it in our world. Not only is the idea misunderstood; the word itself is often intensely disliked. Many people haven't even a nodding acquaintance with humility as a way of life. Much of the everyday talk we hear, and a great deal of what we read, highlights man's pride in his own achievements.

#### **Tradition Seven (Long Form):**

The A.A. groups themselves ought to be fully supported by the voluntary contributions of their ownmembers. We think that each group should soon achieve this ideal; that any public solicitation of funds using the name of Alcoholics Anonymous is highly dangerous whether by groups, clubs, hospitals, or other outside agencies, that acceptance of large gifts from any source, or of contributions carrying any obligation whatever, is unwise.

Then, too, we view with much concern those A.A. treasuries which continue, beyond prudent reserves, to accumulate funds for no stated A.A. purpose. Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surely destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority.

#### **Tradition Seven Checklist:**

- 1. Honestly now, do I do all I can to help AA (my group, my central office, my GSO) remain self-supporting? Could I put a little more into the basket on behalf of the new guy who can't afford it yet? How generous was I when tanked in a barroom?
- 2. Should the Grapevine sell advertising space to book publishers and drug companies, so it could make a big profit and become a bigger magazine, in full color, at a cheaper price per copy?
- 3. If GSO runs short of funds some year, wouldn't it be okay to let the government subsidize AA groups in hospitals and prisons?
- 4. Is it more important to get a big AA collection from a few people, or a smaller collection in which more members participate?
- 5. Is a group treasurer's report unimportant AA business? How does the treasurer feel about it?
- 6. How important in my recovery is the feeling of self-respect, rather than the feeling of being always under obligation for charity received?

#### Concept VII:

The Charter and Bylaws of the General Service Board are legal instruments, empowering the trustees to manage and conduct world service affairs. The Conference Charter is not a legal document; it relies upon tradition and the A.A. purse for final effectiveness.

#### **Concept VII Checklist:**

- Do we act responsibly regarding the "power of the purse"?
- Do we realize that the practical and spiritual power of the Conference will nearly always be superior to the legal power of the G.S.B.?

Want to get involved and do rewarding service work? Currently there are many Service Work opportunities available at Intergroup.

**24/7 Hotline Volunteers:** Volunteer monthly, bi-monthly or weekly. Answer the phones when the office is closed.

**12-Step Volunteers:** When someone calls the office/hotline for help and the hotline worker cannot easily help, we try to hook them up with a person of the same sex as geographically close to them as we can. That way if you want to connect at a meeting, it's convenient. Callers usually need to be 12 stepped, are new to the area, need directions to local meetings, etc. This is separate from the Hotline and you can stipulate the type of calls you are willing to receive.

# How can groups participate?


To help support AA's essential services, the General Service Conference suggests that individual groups, through an informed group conscience, adopt a specific contribution plan tailored to meet the group's financial situation. Once the basic group expenses have been taken care of (for example, rent, refreshments, AA literature, Grapevine literature, local meeting lists, GSR travel expenses to attend service functions) and a "prudent reserve" has been set aside to cover any emergency contingencies that might arise, the group may decide to further carry the message by sending money to the following AA service entities.

- The local district, which communicates directly with the groups, providing the district group conscience for the area assemblies and serving as a link between the area delegates and the GSRs.
- The area committee, which coordinates vital AA activities over a broad geographic area, sends a delegate to the annual General Service Conference, holds area assemblies to determine the needs of the Fellowship, and provides information at all levels of service.
- The local intergroup or central office, which may provide phone service for Twelfth Step calls and other inquiries, coordination of group activities, AA literature sales, institutions work, public information, and cooperation with the professional community activities.
- AA's General Service Office, which functions as a storehouse of AA information, communicating with members and groups around the world, publishes AA literature, and supplies information and experience to professionals and others interested in AA.

#### AA in Australia

April 1999 AA Grapevine (thanks Ronny H.)

Nonalcoholic friends, pioneer members, early meetings, anonymity breaks, resentments, and survival--how it all began Down Under.

I am always amazed at the fragility of circumstances surrounding the origins of Alcoholics Anonymous in the United States.

When I read Bill's story in the literature, I still hold my breath when I come to the precarious moments, such as Bill W. standing in the foyer of the Mayflower Hotel, where after being sober for two months, he is drawn to the gay chatter of the bar but turns instead to the telephone and a call which will ultimately lead him to Dr. Bob.

The story of how Alcoholics Anonymous originated in Australia has a similar fragility in circumstances. As in America, it was the nonalcoholic friends of AA, particularly in the medical and spiritual fields, who helped fledgling AA groups to strengthen and grow.

Three men were largely responsible--Arch McKinnon, a psychiatric nurse involved in the early treatment of alcoholics, Dr. S. J. Minogue, a psychiatrist and medical attendant, and Father Tom Dunlea, a Catholic priest working with alcoholics and derelicts.

These three men were working separately with alcoholics before coming together in a concentrated effort.

An early attempt at starting AA in Australia had failed. Father Dunlea and Dr. Minogue, after communicating with AA Headquarters in New York and receiving a copy of the book Alcoholics Anonymous, decided to experiment and gathered a bunch of skid row drunks together, took them to live in the country, clothed, fed, and gave them a warm place to sleep. As the group began to sober up, Father Dunlea became impressed by the seeming success of the group and decided to approach a wealthy businessman who was willing to give money to practical solutions to the treatment of alcoholism. Father Dunlea brought this potential benefactor to the country camp to show him its success, but when they arrived, before them lay a scene of drunken and unconscious men, who in the priest's absence had consumed methylated spirit. The businessman left promptly.

Meanwhile Arch McKinnon read an article in the American Journal of Psychiatry called "The Therapeutic Mechanism of Alcoholics Anonymous" by Dr. H. M. Tiebout. McKinnon wrote to the editor of the journal and was sent a copy of the Big Book from AA Headquarters. McKinnon read the book and tried to extract the mechanisms of the program of recovery described in its pages.

He could accept in theory the basic principles of the program, but he needed to see if they would work with those alcoholics being treated in the hospital where he worked. He didn't believe that regular patients readmitted time after time would be receptive, so he decided to wait until he found what he thought was a likely candidate. Then Rex was admitted. Suffering from chronic alcoholism, Rex was intelligent, a businessman, and from a well-known banking family in Australia. Rex read and accepted the propositions of the Big Book, and after leaving the hospital a recovered man, continued to visit the hospital where he and McKinnon waited for another alcoholic to work with. Soon another candidate arrived and after listening to what Rex had to say, decided to try AA. Then a third man, Bill, joined the pair, and so started the first successful AA group in Australia. The men pounded the pavement until they found a cafe where they could sit over a cup of coffee and meet.

When Father Dunlea and Dr. Minogue heard of the efforts of McKinnon, they contacted him and lent their support to the struggling new group. Now that the numbers had increased, the wandering meetings needed to find a more permanent base.

Rex found a job and an apartment in Bligh House, formerly a house for convict servants where the windows still had the original bars on them. Regular AA meetings took place in Rex's apartment, and once it settled down, the group started a publicity campaign to attract alcoholics to recovery.

As a result of these efforts, the meeting also attracted philanthropists, journalists, social workers, hard core alcoholics, and some psychotic individuals claiming they were alcoholics. Meetings became unmanageable and were distracted from the primary purpose of carrying the message. Although the group was not at this time actively practicing the Traditions of AA, they began to operate along those lines in order to get back to basics. The philanthropists were told AA did not need their money, the journalists were satisfied after one of the AAs wrote a long and unsensational article for the Sydney Morning Herald, Sydney's major newspaper, the social workers were turned away. Finally the group found a meeting room in North Sydney.

The group still consisted of nonalcoholic members as well as alcoholic members. The nonalcoholics held positions of office in the group alongside the alcoholic members. The group even had a selection process for members wanting to join: Dr. Minogue assessed prospective members by interviewing them in the formal psychiatric manner. After a while, however, he stopped doing this as it yielded no positive results.

A lack of literature frustrated the group's attempts to carry the message. After the war, the Australian Customs Department was reluctant to import the Big Book because of wartime dollar exchange restrictions. Thus the message of the Big Book was carried orally and via a pamphlet published by the early members called "The Basic Principles of AA." This brochure had extracts from the Big Book and other literature, and greatly helped carry the message.

One of the pioneers of the group, a man called Jack, became resentful at how the group was being managed, and as he had difficulty accepting the spiritual basis of the program, he broke away and started another group. Jack called his group "The Commonsense Group," deleting the spiritual component. The breakaway group attracted some of the early members, and there was fear that it would undo AA in Australia. However both groups survived, until Jack died from an overdose of paraldehyde, and the breakaway members decided to return to the original group.


To encourage attendance, the members approached a well-known radio announcer, Frank Sturge Harty, to talk about AA on his show. Sturge Harty had already put AA over the air in 1944 but was unaware of any Australian AA group existing. He was glad to help and even became a regular attendee at the AA meeting! Eventually, the nonalcoholic members left the recovered alcoholics to manage their own affairs according to the Twelve Traditions. The group began to attract alcoholics who wanted to recover using the Twelve Steps, and many of these began to stick around for longer and longer periods. Despite the slow growth and unsettled meetings of early AA in Sydney, alcoholics did sober up and stay sober.

Women began to play a major part in the growth of Australian AA. The first woman came to AA in 1946, but it was a nonalcoholic woman, the wife of an alcoholic, whose articulate and accurate tales of life with her husband when he was drinking became a powerful message in the print and electronic media of the day, and attracted men and women into AA.

Another woman significant to the growth and development of AA was an American actress who'd sobered up in AA and came to Australia to perform with a touring company. As she went around the country, she broke her anonymity and talked at large public meetings as she toured with her theatre company. She was pivotal in the establishment of AA in Brisbane, where she met with an alcoholic lawyer who had not been able to get sober. During their meeting, the lawyer accepted the principles of AA and started AA meetings in Brisbane.

Today AA in Australia is growing, and attracting more young people and women. There are daily meetings in every large city and an increasing number of meetings in outlying areas. With the growing ease of travel between the United States and Australia, and the visiting of sober men in the U.S. Naval Services, Australians continued to learn from their American alcoholic counterparts. More and more meetings are being modeled on the American one-hour format. The most common type of meeting in Australia is a ninety-minute meeting where members are chosen randomly from the floor by a chairperson. This month, the first Australian International convention in Brisbane hopes to attract AAs from Australia and around the world. Despite fragile beginnings and early adversity, Alcoholics Anonymous in Australia has grown to a large and healthy Fellowship.




